Just Energy for All What is That? Where do We Begin?

Just Energy for All is a UMW initiative based on the principle that everyone should share the costs and benefits of the transition to alternative energy equally.

Fossil fuels (coal, oil, gas) have been used to produce the energy that powers our lives for over 150 years. Energy production emits waste gasses that absorb heat from the sun and are contributors to global warming and climate change. In order to slow global warming, alternative, renewable energy sources, which do not emit the waste gasses, are being harnessed. Some examples are hydroelectric, geothermal wind, solar, and ocean current and tidal energy. The energy industry is switching from fossil fuels to alternative energies, but it takes time, requires technological innovation, may need changes in policy, legislation, and it costs money.

Lower income populations are more affected by the waste products of the fossil fuel energy industry because the refineries and production facilities are disproportionately located in lower income areas. Health effects such as asthma, cardiovascular disease, and cancer have been associated with refineries. Residents are more susceptible to serious complications of infections such as Covid 19. Because of the age and repair status of the housing, lower income populations often spend a greater proportion of their income on energy. This population should not continue to suffer the monetary and health effects disproportionately as we transition to alternative energies.

The Climax UMW began by educating ourselves about energy sources and waste gases with the goal of reforming our energy habits. We learned about the sources and limitations of fossil fuels, the production and problems with carbon dioxide, the global warming potential of methane, and the effects of global warming on habitats, wildlife and insects, seasons, weather, and sea levels. Decreasing energy use will decrease global warming. We identified sources of energy use in our lives and applied the principles of rethink/replace, reduce, reuse, and recycle.

We look forward to doing Energy Justice projects on a local scale. Nationally, the UMW is committed to active involvement in the transition to alternative energies. God charged us with ruling and caring for his creation. We need to do a better job of taking care of Earth, and not using it up. Every change we as individuals make to reduce our energy consumption will help.
